Your child may be able to get means tested free school meals if you receive any of the following benefits. This will also entitle you to free milk and discounted school trips.

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on - paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit - if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Social Media Apps

What age should my child be to use these apps?



What risks are there of my child using these apps?

Whilst there are benefits to being online, there are risks too regardless of your child's age. Risks include your child viewing inappropriate content, sharing personal information, cyberbullying and grooming.

Reporting functions

If your child is using any of the above apps then make sure you show them how to use the reporting facilities within each app and ensure your child knows that they must tell you or another trusted adult if they see anything upsetting online. Use the apps together and explore the different security and privacy settings.

Reading updates

Every Tuesday afternoon, we have a reading celebration assembly. In this assembly, the whole school celebrates the children who have earned a reading award. Children earn a sticker each time they read at home. Please read with your child each night, and write in their reading record, to help them reach their next prize! Reading records are checked daily in school.



Year 3 are currently reading 'How to Train your Dragon' by Cresida Cowell. The children are really enjoying getting to know the characters in the story and they cannot wait to see what is going to happen in the end!

Maths updates

Maths at Malvin's continues to be a strength of our children, who are always keen and excited to show their books off to visitors.

We would like to take this opportunity to remind Year 4 parents of the upcoming national Times Table check that their children will participate in in a few months' time. This looks at the children's recall of all their times tables up to 12 x 12. The soundcheck feature on Time Table Rockstars allows your child to experience the types of questions and timings that they will experience on the day. All children have logins for Times Table Rockstars and we encourage them to use it both in school and at home if at all possible in order to improve their recall. For our Key Stage One and Reception children, Numbots can be accessed, which will help their recall of number facts.

Pastoral Team Updates:

Young Carers:

A number of our children have taken on the role of being a Young Carer for a range of reasons. We are proud that Malvin's Close Academy has recently been recognised as one of the schools in Northumberland who are providing outstanding support for our Young Carers:

"Our shining light for good practice is on Malvin's Close Academy who have engaged with our Young Carer Service, going above and beyond to support young carers in their schools. The Family Support Team within the school have identified, supported, and referred 10 children to our Young Carer Support Project over the last few months. Our Young Carer Support Coordinator regularly visits children providing a range of one-to-one support, tailored to the individual needs of each child. The Family Workers keep in regular contact with our services and share service information, newsletters, and information about what support is available to both the young carers and their

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families. One of the first to receive the new Young Carers in Schools Toolkit as pilot, they were keen to embed this into daily practice and have already taken on board many of the key recommendations outlined in the Toolkit. One of the most exciting developments for young carers are plans for a dedicated Young Carers Group within the school and it is hoped that this will be launched when the new term begins. Well done Wise Academies, we are looking forward to what the future brings and are excited to continue working with you to improve the lives of young carers attending your schools! Safeguarding

1. Online Safety

Using online facilities to help with learning, keep in contact with others and to give some 'down time' is part of all of our lives, but it is important that we all know how to keep children safe when doing so.

- All social networking platforms and apps have minimum age limits. Some social networks use technologies that might not be appropriate for some ages, or engage with communities that are made up of people much older than your child.
- Many sites include an instant message function which allows private conversations. Not everyone your child meets online will be who they say they are. -
- Most social networking sites have an app version, meaning your child will have access to the social network from their smartphone or tablet. Some app versions of social networks use the location of the phone.
- Chat rooms and forums can connect people who are complete strangers and can be un-moderated.
- Information shared between friends can be easily copied and may spread.
- It isn't easy to take back information that has been posted – and can be impossible if it's already been shared.

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- Chat rooms and forums are one of the places online groomers go to connect with children. They can also be places where people use inappropriate language. This is sometimes done through video chat programmes.

What can I do to keep my child safe?

1. Think about online routines: Have a conversation with your child about online safety and agree to some rules to help keep them safe.
2. Have a conversation about online pressures and cyberbullying: Remember to talk to your child about what they are doing online and who they are talking to. Check in with them regularly and remind them they can talk to you, another trusted adult, like a teacher, or a ChildLine counsellor about anything they are worried about.
3. Set up devices safely: Make sure you set it up with your child, exploring any safety features. Remember to use parental controls.
4. Keep children safe on conferencing apps: Supervise your child when they use these apps; remind your child not to share chat links or passwords on social media; explore any security features like how to report and block; talk to your child about what they are sharing.
