Children should not wear earrings for school under any circumstances

Children should be in PE uniform on PE days. There is no need to carry a PE uniform in a bag. If your child is not in the correct PE uniform, they will be asked to come to school in their uniform and change into their PE kit.

Children should not be bringing any toys into school. If children are found to have toys from home they will be confiscated until the end of the day where they will then be handed to the parent/carer collecting.

<u>Head lice</u>

As parents/carers it is important that you are checking your child's hair regularly. As with any medical issue it is your responsibility to ensure that your child and family are treated as soon as possible if head lice or eggs are present. If you would like any support or advice please contact the family team, local pharmacy or GP.

<u>Climbing Frame</u> Please do not allow your child to use the climbing frame at the beginning or end of the school day. The climbing frame is closed for repair.

<u>School Parking</u>

Just a reminder the school car park is for staff only. Parents should not use the staff car park to drop off or pick up.

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E-safety Updates:

Early Years

Is your child online? It's important that devices are set up with age appropriate parental controls and access is restricted to appropriate apps/content. We would advise that children only access devices when you are with them. Sometimes, regardless of what controls we have in place, children may accidentally view inappropriate content so it's important we are around to help them if they do. The Australian eSafety Commissioner has published a short booklet including advice and guidance on how to navigate the online world with your child. 

Being confident with times tables is really important for children in primary school and regular practice of tables is one of most valuable ways parents/carers can support children in their learning.





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Designated Safeguarding Team

What is a Designated Safeguarding Lead?

Governing bodies should ensure that the school or college designates an appropriate senior member of staff to take lead responsibility for child protection.

Key aspects of the 'Designated Safeguarding Lead' role include:

- Making sure all staff are aware how to raise safeguarding concerns
- Ensuring all staff understand the symptoms of child abuse and neglect
- Referring any concerns to social care
- Monitoring children who are the subject of child protection plans
- Maintaining accurate and secure child protection records
- Raising awareness of the school's safeguarding policies and procedures, and
- ensuring they are implemented and reviewed regularly
