This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

This is about what we teach in lesson time, how much time is spent teaching music and any music qualifications or awards that pupils can achieve.

Music is taught in class every other week and is informed by the Model Music Curriculum (March 2021). Lessons are a minimum of 40 minutes and are taught by class teachers.

Teaching is supported by specialist planning, and a combination of Sing Up and Charanga curriculum schemes of work. This musical learning is further supported by weekly singing assemblies as either a whole school or in key stages, lasting 20 minutes.

Children in Year 3 learn an instrument as a whole-class ensemble taught by a class teacher.

All children are given the opportunity to sing and play percussion instruments each year as part of our progressive curriculum, starting with experimenting with sound,

familiar tunes and rhythm in EYFS and culminating in more focused composition and performance related units in Year 6.

Children are welcomed into school every day with music playing throughout the building via speakers, allowing them to hear a range of genres, from Classical and Romantic pieces to jazz, rock and film scores.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This is about opportunities for pupils to sing and play music, outside of lesson time, including choirs, ensembles and bands, and how pupils can make progress in music beyond the core curriculum.

At Malvin's Close Academy, we currently offer individual and small-group lessons on guitar, violin, clarinet and flute through peripatetic teachers. Teachers visit the school each week and teach children in half an hour lessons.

Individual and small group lessons are funded by parents. However, for those children who are Pupil Premium, these lessons can be funded by the Pupil Premium provision.

We have a thriving Key Stage 2 Choir that runs once a week after school and performs throughout the year. This is free and accessible to all Key Stage 2 children.

Children also take part in assemblies held in conjunction with the Yamaha Music School several times a year.

As part of growing links with the local Yamaha Music School, all children from Year 2 to 6 are offered a free lesson on an instrument at the school. This is organised by the Yamaha Music School. Parents can then pay for their children to continue lessons.

Part C: Musical experiences

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

Children will have the opportunity to perform or experience high quality music this academic year.

These opportunities include:

- The Last Post played by a member of staff during Remembrance day celebrations.

- The choir performing at local care homes and businesses at Christmas, as well as performing at the Big Gig concert in Newcastle in June 2025

- Music is played every morning as children enter school.

- Assemblies run by Yamaha Music School to introduce children to a range of different instruments and genres of music.

- Children in Key Stage 2 invited to concerts at the Yamaha Music School to watch pianists and percussionists perform.

- Children sing weekly in assembly.
- EYFS nativity in the run up to Christmas.
- Key Stage 1 take part in Harvest festival celebrations.
- Year 6 perform a musical in July.

In the future

This is about what the school is planning for subsequent years.

In future years, our Music Development Plan aims to achieve the following:

- Further development and refinement of a music scheme that ensures consistency and progression from EYFS through to Year 6.
- Introduction of whole-class ensemble projects delivered by a music specialist. This is to be achieved through building links with the local music hub (Music Partnership North.)
- Apply for grants to help buy a wider range of instruments within school to help reinforce the curriculum and children's learning.
- Further develop performance opportunities for our young musicians throughout the school year, including those receiving tuition through peripatetic teaching.
- Further develop engagement in extra-curricular music for Pupil Premium and SEND children.
- Introduction of a wider range of instruments on offer for small group or individual lessons.
